





Permissive access

http://cwr.naturalengland.org.uk

Increasingly, permissive rights of access are created under the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) farm conservation schemes. On their website you can find details and maps of more than 1,800 walks and rides and areas of open access, though only a small proportion have access for all. Printed copies are held by some councils. These rights of access are often only for a few years, and more are being added. Currently there are only three DEFRA sites with 'Easy Access' in West Yorkshire:

• Fairburn Ings RSPB Reserve Grid ref: SE 451272

A 1.5 mile linear walk along the River Aire at the wetland reserve near Castleford. Car parking, accessible toilets and visitor centre (see the *Wildlife & Conservation* section - page 71).

• Penistone Hill Grid ref: SE 025370

A 0.6 mile walk through the country park, a former quarry near Howarth. Car park off Dimples Lane. Wheelchair access to the pond via a sandstone path and recycled boardwalk section. Limited wheelchair access to geological features.

• Rodley Nature Reserve Grid ref: SE 234362

A 1.5 mile walk through a lovely nature reserve in the Kirkstall Valley flood plain adjacent to the River Aire and the Leeds-Liverpool Canal. Parking and accessible toilets. Limited opening times (see the *Wildlife & Conservation* section - page 72).

Under the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 (CRoW), the public can walk freely on mapped areas of mountain, moor, heath, downland and registered common land without having to stick to paths. This major new right to walk freely over mapped 'access land' was completed across England on October 31st 2005. The new right of open access includes using a wheelchair or mobility scooter. Clearly, most areas will not be very accessible, but you can view the CRoW maps for further information, or give the Contact Centre a call. Access land is shown on the new OS maps with the symbol below.



Please note that paths are subject to natural erosion and their quality may vary over time. Maintenance of the paths should be on-going. Please ring your local council's Access Officer or Open Country if you would like to report or comment on any accessible paths.

A $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile circular walk along the River Wharfe, starting at Brook Street car park in the town centre where there are accessible toilets.

Alternatively there is roadside parking along New Brook Street. You can download the walk route from our online 'Breakfree' pack above. Manor House Museum is 100 yards away in the Castle Yard; ground floor only accessible to wheelchair users, 1 step down – call 01943 600066 for more information (closed to the public at the time of writing).





Ilkley Tarn

Located on Ilkley Moor, the tarn was developed by Victorians as an ornamental feature; they would skate on the lake in the winter months. Accessible toilets in the town centre (Brook Street car park) and a car park at the top of Wells Road. Cross over the road from the car park and turn up Crossbeck Road, take the path immediately on the right and go through the gate. The path is wide and has a tarmac surface suitable for wheelchairs, though there is rather a steep climb up to the tarn and a strong pusher is required. Once at the Tarn there is a flat, circular walk with plenty of seating.

Keighley (Redcar) Tarn

The surfaced perimeter path is about a third of a mile long. Picnic tables and benches along the route and parking off Blackhill Lane.

A wonderful country park with woodlands, open moor, and a wildflower meadow. The path around Coppice Pond is wheelchair accessible and has a duck feeding platform. Accessible play area, café and small visitor centre (limited opening hours).

<u>Calderdale</u>

The reserve is accessed from the A6025 (Elland Road), Brighouse. Turn along a road by the side of Cromwell House (a large red brick building), then left under a height barrier into a small car park. The reserve is signposted from the far end of the car park. A mix of woodland, wetlands and grasslands, and rich in plants and wildlife. Situated next to the Calder and Hebble Navigation, the River Calder runs through the reserve. The





reserve has many paths suitable for wheelchair access which are generally smooth with no steep gradients. A RADAR key is required to open the gate fully to allow easier access.

A beautiful wooded valley with deep ravines and way marked walks, passing the 18th century Gibson Mill. Some access for disabled visitors along the main track, though it is rough in parts and a strong companion is advised - contact the Estate Office for information. Accessible picnic tables at the car park. Sensory trail. Accessible shop, cafe and parking at Gibson Mill – prebooking required.

Turn off the A629 Halifax to Keighley road at the Causeway Foot Inn. There is parking on three levels by the site entrance. Wheelchair users may park by the toilet block and dam wall if prior arrangements are made. Other Blue Badge parking is available at the entrance to the main car park. The level 1¼ mile walk around the reservoir is fully accessible. There are a number of paths through the woodland but these are not wheelchair accessible. Picnic areas and accessible toilets are on site.



Disabled parking at the White House reached via Johnny Lane, Otley (off Birdcage Walk) and a long winding driveway. Scooter available for hire from the White House Visitor Centre; book ahead. There is a 1km linear route, which can be muddy and uneven in places; other Chevin routes may be suitable for scooters (see the Chevin Forest Park website above). Café, field study centre and ranger station. Accessible, changing places toilet. Heritage and Geology Audio Trails available from the website.

Eccup Reservoir

Map: OS Explorer 289 Grid ref: SE 306417 On the outskirts of Leeds, access off the A61/Harrogate Road

A tarmac road (used by vehicles) follows on to a 3 mile route that leads around two sides of the reservoir. A more tranquil accessible footpath leads from the dam to Reservoir Lodge on the southern side of the lake. There is a red kite viewing area near the dam. No parking on site, although you can park on the roadside with care near the dam.

Gallows Hill Nature Reserve

Map: OS Explorer 297 Grid ref: SE 211457 Access is from Mill Way, off Pool Road, Otley.

The reserve occupies a strip of land on the south side of the River Wharfe, east of Otley. Car park with height barrier. Good wheelchair accessible paths around the site. You can cross the Wharfe and continue your walk along Wharfemeadows Park, which is paved. By the weir there is a cafè, children's playground and accessible toilet (Radar key required).

Something completely different. A walking history tour of Otley's famous pubs. Maybe one for a wet or snowy day, or as part of a tour of Otley Chevin or Wharfemeadows Park (see previous page). Leaflets available in Otley pubs and at the library on Nelson Street. Accessible toilets on Orchard Gate (RADAR key required) and at the library during opening hours. Plenty of car parks in town and Blue Badge parking on Kirkgate.

Waterloo Lake, Roundhay Park, Leeds

Much of the park is accessible with tarmac paths and easy gradients. A 2.5km circular walk, around Waterloo Lake is mainly level, but there are a few barriers around the water's edge. Benches and rest places en route. Car park at the end of Park Avenue. Café with accessible toilet.

Yeadon Tarn

A level tarmac surfaced path around the tarn, it also provides an ideal location for plane spotting! Car parks off Cemetery Road and the High Street; accessible toilet near to the children's play area (RADAR key required). Disabled parking available in the Tarn activity centre car park off Town Street. Orienteering course for people with visual impairments.









Leeds Owl Trail

You can follow the trail around the streets, finding out about the history of the owls in Leeds and looking out for the 25 owl statues along the way. Download a leaflet from the website above or pick one up from the information centre next to the train station. Blue Badge parking bays on Cookridge Street and Percival Street which are near to the start of the trail at Millennium Square. Accessible toilets at the nearby City Museum.

Accessible café and two picnic areas on site, as well as an accessible bird hide.

The Lin Dike Link and Coal Tips trails provide up to 4 miles of gravel paths running alongside the River Aire. Accessed via Fairburn Ings RSPB nature reserve close to the A1. There is a steep hill at the beginning, but most of the path is level with a gravel surface (see the *Wildlife & Conservation* section – page 71).

Situated off the A61 between Wakefield and Barnsley, the site covers 237 acres of mixed woodland and a lake. The 1½ mile lakeside path is suitable for wheelchair users with seating and leaning posts by the path. There is also a pleasant wheelchair accessible boardwalk through the woodland. Accessible toilets are available in the smaller car park by the dam (RADAR key required).

You can follow the accessible paths around the parkland; nearly 1.2km long. The Carriageway Path reinstates the route of an 18th century carriage drive to the Obelisk Lodge. The Hardwick Beck path provides a surfaced route along the course of the stream heading east to a new 'rustic' picnic area. Admission fee for the house, but the parkland is free (see the *Outings* section – page 33).



Pugneys Country Park

A 250 acre site with two lakes, built on what was formerly an open cast mine and sand and gravel quarry, the largest of which has a 1.6 mile track running around it. An electric wheelchair is available for use around the park for a small charge. Cafè and accessible toilets by the car park.

A 1.3 mile level, wheelchair accessible circular path around the reservoir, Part tarmac, part grass. Car park off Haigh Moor Road. No stiles or steps.

Blackmoorfoot

Provides wide views of Blackmoorfoot Reservoir. Running along three sides of the reservoir, the path is flat and easy, the only gradients are a short ramp at entrance and on public highway at Back Lane. The route is 1.3 miles long. Park on Reservoir Road. No stiles or steps.







The Cycleway offers walkers and cyclists a traffic-free, easy going route through more than 20km of outstanding scenery in the Calder Valley, linking the busy market towns of Todmorden, Hebden Bridge and Sowerby Bridge. You can access the route from Hollins Mill Lane in Sowerby Bridge which is a short ride away from the train station.

Further afield, paths are accessible to wheelchair users though there are some undulating areas. The Lin Dike Link and Coal Tips trails provide up to 4 miles of gravel paths running alongside the River Aire.

Only assistance dogs are permitted on the reserve. Open on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays.



National Rail enquiries provide information on rail travel including routes, departure times and costs, as well as information for disabled passengers on travel assistance, discounts, accessible stations and train facilities.



In West Yorkshire, buses and local trains are overseen by Metro (West Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive). West Yorkshire Day Rovers give unlimited off-peak travel, while Metro cards cover longer periods. Large bus operators such as First and Arriva also offer good value deals that you can buy on the bus. Many bus routes in West Yorkshire offer low floor, easy access buses which can accommodate one wheelchair. Most of the main bus stations have accessible toilets, variable height ticket counters and highly visible staff presence to assist all passengers. A telephone pre-booking service is offered by Huddersfield Bus Station to assist people with disabilities and restricted mobility. 

Blue Badge Scheme

The Blue Badge scheme is for people with severe mobility problems. It allows Blue Badge holders to park close to where they need to go. The scheme operates throughout the UK and is managed by local authorities, who deal with applications and issue Blue Badges.

Blue Badge holders may:

- Park as long as they wish in a disc parking zone provided that the Blue Badge is displayed.
- Park on a single or double yellow line for up to three hours provided that the Blue Badge and time disc is displayed and the vehicle causes no obstruction.
- Always check individual car parks to see if you are required to pay or not as practice differs widely.

Wheelchair Hire



- Ensure that your bike is safe to ride
