East Yorkshire has many claims to fame; did you know, for example, that Britain's tallest man came from Market Weighton, and that Hull is home to England's smallest window?

For people interested in wildlife and conservation there is much that can be done from home or a local accessible area. Whatever your chosen form of countryside recreation, whether it's joining a group, doing voluntary work, or getting yourself out into the countryside on your own, we hope you will get as much out of it as we do.

There is still some way to go before we have a properly accessible countryside. By contacting Open Country or another of the organisations listed here, you can help to encourage better access for all in the future.



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Since moving to East Yorkshire in 2021, I have developed a deep appreciation for the beautiful landscape and many enjoyable walks this area has to offer. Here at Kilnwick Percy Hall in Pocklington, home to Madhyamaka Kadampa Meditation Centre, we have recently made some progress in opening up the 48 acres of parkland, woods and lakeside area surrounding the historic building.

In Spring 2023, we developed a new 700 metre accessible footpath from the upper car park down to the lake, which was later extended with a looped walk that includes accessible seating areas. Now everyone can enjoy this peaceful oasis and take time out to watch the ducks, herons, geese, red kites and other wildlife that share this special habitat.

In 2024, we widened and flattened the woodland path between the upper car park and walled garden, and we continue to apply for funding to make more of the scenic parkland surrounding Kilnwick Percy Hall free and accessible to all.

We hope you will enjoy all that East Yorkshire has to offer and extend a warm invitation to visit us here at Kilnwick Percy Hall,

A 79-mile walking route in the chalk landscape of the Yorkshire Wolds. The National Trail wends through some of the most tranquil and gentle countryside in England. There are seven step free, stile free 'Easy Access' walks detailing path conditions, facilities and points of interest, all of which can be downloaded from the website above.

Easy Going Walks

Please note that paths are subject to natural erosion and their quality may vary over time, though maintenance should be ongoing. Please contact your local council's Access Officer or Open Country if you would like to report or comment on the poor condition of any accessible paths.

Beverley Mobility Walk

A walk suitable for people using wheelchairs or mobility scooters. The route takes advantage of 'dropped kerbs', wider sections of pavement and selected stopping points. Accessible toilets (RADAR key required) at several locations around the town centre, including Dyer Street near to the start of the walk, where there are also Blue Badge bays.

Brayton Barff

Actually in North Yorkshire, Brayton Barff is a covered reservoir set in ancient woodland and is a great spot for bird watching and spring bluebells. The walk is 1.3 miles along crushed stone paths that are undulating, but suitable for wheelchair users. Car park off Barff Lane, though a height barrier will prevent larger vehicles from entering. A leaflet can be downloaded from the website above.

Bridlington Old Town Trail

A leaflet, 'Bridlington Old Town Trail' gives details of the town's living heritage. The trail takes you around the historical old town of Bridlington which was originally the main part of the town. Accessible toilets (RADAR key required) along the route on the corner of St John Street and High Street. Some Blue Badge spaces at Stepney Grove car park and along High Street.

Flamborough; South Landing

South Sea Road, Flamborough, YO15 1AE Signposted from the B1259 to Flamborough Head.

An accessible trail passes through woodland and meadow, finishing at the cliff top, with a view onto the beach and the splendid vista of Bridlington Bay. There is a nice sculpture trail around the site and frequent resting places. The Living Seas Centre has an accessible toilet, a café (check ahead for opening times) and a pay and display car park - Blue Badge holders must pay. The pebbly beach can be reached down the <u>very</u> steep road to the Lifeboat Station (no parking for visitors). There is also an accessible toilet at North Landing (take the B1255 out of Flamborough - North Marine Road), with a café, accessible shop and great views!







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Disused Rail Trails

The four rail trails are Hull to Hornsea, Hull to Withernsea, Holme-on-Spalding Moor to Bubwith and Beverley to Market Weighton (Hudson Way). They are ideal routes to use either for a short stroll, family walk or as part of a long-distance route. Some of the railway lines have sections that are accessible for wheelchairs, although some routes have ramps that may be difficult for some users. In the winter months, unsurfaced sections can become muddy.

Humber Bridge

This is one of the world's longest single-span suspension bridges. Tolls apply for vehicles crossing. The bridge combines footways and cycle paths (tarmac) on both carriageways, which are wheelchair accessible. It is just under a mile each way. You can combine it with a trip to Far Ings Nature Reserve and Waters' Edge Country Park which are at the south end of the bridge (*see Accessible Wildlife Sites – pages 27 & 29*). Parking and accessible toilets are located at Humber Bridge Country Park (see below).

Humber Bridge Country Park

A former chalk quarry, now an area of 50 acres with woodland, meadows and trails. Accessible toilets in the car park (RADAR key required). Several trails around the park; it is a hilly site and there are steps in places, but some paths may be suitable for wheelchair users. Starting on the Hessle foreshore there is a 1 mile barrier free, level walk, with regular rest places.

Old Railway Station, Stamford Bridge

Church Road, YO41 1DG (10 miles east of York, on the A166)

This pleasant linear walk along the disused railway line (half a mile each way) starts at the Old Railway Station on Church Road. The tarmac path has good wheelchair access. The walk offers brilliant views over the River Derwent and surrounding area. Some aspects of the old station and track have been preserved. The nearest accessible toilets are in the town at The Square (RADAR key required), where there are also cafés and a memorial to the 1066 Battle of Stamford Bridge. There is a car park with Blue Badge bays off Viking Road.

Promenades

The resort towns of Bridlington, Hornsea and Withernsea have wheelchair accessible promenades. Bridlington seafront, in particular, takes you along what must be one of the longest pieces of artwork in Britain, with murals, sculptures and paintings. Beach wheelchairs are available to hire; the large rubber wheels are designed especially for outdoor use, making the beach easily accessible. Contact the Coastal Services Office on Princess Mary Promenade for more information: 01262 678255. Free to hire, but a deposit is required. There are accessible toilets on Marine Drive (Hornsea), Central Promenade (Withernsea) and Princess Mary Promenade (Bridlington).

Seven Corners Lane Walk, Beverley

Amble through a part of Beverley, which you didn't even know existed! A 100 yards or so from the traffic lights at North Bar, the lane leaves North Bar Without to twist and turn its way around olde worlde cottages and bigger, period houses before emerging on York Road at Sterne's Corner. A relatively flat route without any barriers, approximately 0.5 miles long. There are accessible toilets on Lord Roberts Road and Station Square. We have been told that during the summer months cows and bulls may be present on the common, so please take care!

Snaith Heritage Trail

An easy going walk, mainly on pavements suitable for wheelchairs, approximately 1.5 miles long. Start point and parking at Snaith Station car park. The website also has a number of other walks in the area, with route maps and details on the walks that are wheelchair accessible.

Sugar Mill Ponds, Nr Goole

Follow the A614 from Rawcliffe, taking the signs to Rawcliffe Bridge. Turn right at the brown tourist sign up a single-track road. www.sugarmillponds.org.uk

Two large ponds dominate the site, once a brick works. There is a mosaic of habitats including reed bed, woodland and scrub. Picnic area. Level paths. Viewing areas are built over the ponds for wheelchair access. Disabled parking bay. No toilets.

Lots to offer for a fun-filled day out with a great range of birds and animals including parrots, owls, flamingos, zebras, meerkats, lemurs, camels and raccoons. Daily events include flying demonstrations, feeding times and small animal holding. Café, gift shops, picnic areas, accessible parking and toilets. Generally hard surfaced, flat paths, but some parts of the park may not be easy to get around for everyone, so do contact them for more information.

Brilliant access! The two lakes are home to the National Collection of Hardy Water Lilies, with over 80 varieties. The lakes teem with fish, including Koi carp. Open air band concerts on some summer Sundays. Apart from the rockery the gardens are very accessible, with a number of wheelchairs available for free loan, but best to book in advance if you can. Special viewing platforms allow wheelchair users to feed the fish at close quarters. Shop, museum, tearoom, toilets and even the children's playground are accessible. Seats everywhere. Blue Badge parking near to the entrance. Essential carers get free admission.

On the A166 York to Bridlington Road between Driffield and Bridlington. A magnificent example of late Elizabethan architecture. Seasonal opening. Ground floor only accessible, but reduced rate offered. In order to preserve the historic items, motorised wheelchairs, buggies and scooters are not permitted in the house; a manual wheelchair is available to borrow. The gardens contain over 3,000 different plants, with a walled garden, jungle garden, giant games and even a maze. Café, ice cream parlour, shops and plant sales. Nearly everything is accessible on paving slabs or gravel. There are a few small (3cm) sills to the restaurant, shop and maze. Blue Badge parking near house and restaurant. Carers free.

Elizabethan house situated near the Holderness Coast. The Pleasure Ground has an orangery, gardens with statuary and 300 acres of parkland and wildfowl lakes landscaped by 'Capability Brown' in the 18th century. The ground floor is wheelchair accessible and there is a chair lift to the first floor. Motorised scooters are not permitted in the house; a manual wheelchair is available to borrow. Tea room, picnic area and accessible toilet. The grounds are fairly accessible, but there are large diameter gravel paths in places. Blue Badge parking in the car park and at the front of the Hall. Stair lift to first floor. Wheelchair loan. No charge for essential carers. Seasonal opening.

Fimber Old Station Picnic Site

Located on the B1248 (Sat Nav postcode YO25 3HG)

A pleasant location, on the site of the former Fimber/Sledmere railway station, closed in 1958. It is situated in a small wooded area with bird feeding stations. There are picnic tables and accessible toilets (RADAR key required). Superb snowdrop display in February and good wheelchair access throughout. Seasonal kiosk.

Flamborough Outer Headland Nature Reserve

Lighthouse Road, Flamborough YO15 1AR

The reserve has some tarmac paths around the car park, including a short path to the Signal Station on the cliff top. The Headland Path is grassed









and only firm in the summer months. Great sea views, but access to the beach involves descending a steep flight of steps. Accessible toilets (RADAR key) and a café are located in the Pay & Display car park.

Seasonal opening. A farm with sheep, cows, donkeys, cart rides, animal and fish feeding, homemade ice cream and a tearoom. The paths around the fields and entry to the tearoom are accessible. The toilet is large enough to accommodate a wheelchair.

Hull and East Riding Museum

Boasts some of the most spectacular natural history and archaeology displays in Britain. The museum is wheelchair accessible, with step-free access at the front of the building and two lifts between floors.

Toilets, including an accessible toilet, are situated at the entrance. Blue Badge parking on Gandhi Way and Alfred Gelder Street. Changing Places toilet on the ground floor of the Guildhall; ask at the reception for directions. Manual wheelchair available to borrow. Free admission.

Hull Fish Trail

This unique piece of public art sees explorers search for 41 fish across the city centre, taking in the picturesque Old Town and thriving Fruit Market. The trail starts outside the Hull City Hall ticket office on Queen Victoria Square and finishes at the top of Whitefriargate. Mostly flat footpaths and pedestrian crossings across the route, with some cobbled streets. Accessible toilets on Nelson Street. Several Blue Badge parking bays along Paragon Street or in The Deep car park half way round the trail (*see page 10*). Download a map from the link above or pick one up from Hull City Hall ticket office.

Madhyamaka Kadampa Meditation Centre

The centre is based at Kilnwick Percy Hall, near to Pocklington and is surrounded by almost 50 acres of beautiful grounds, including parkland, a lake, woodland and walled garden (stepped access). There is a smooth path with accessible picnic tables, that leads down to the church and lake, the start of which is accessed by the overflow car park. The paths through the woodland are a little rougher but level. Café, gift shop and accessible toilets in the main building and free lunch time meditation sessions.

Rudston Monolith

Rudston, off the B125, near Bridlington https://rudstonparishcouncil.eastriding.gov

Standing in Rudston Churchyard, at almost 26 feet high, it is Britain's tallest single standing stone. How did the monolith come to be erected over 4000 years ago on a site roughly 10 miles from the nearest source of grit stone? There is wheelchair access from the side lane.

Sewerby Hall and Gardens

Built between 1714 and 1720, the Hall is set in 50 acres of gardens on a cliff top position near Bridlington. The gardens, tearooms, children's zoo, hall and museum are wheelchair accessible (wheelchair access to the house is at the rear of the building), though due to conservation issues, motorised buggies are not permitted in the hall or the first floor of the Old Laundry Block. Accessible toilets in both the Orangery and the courtyard and a Changing Places toilet in the courtyard as well; a RADAR key can be obtained from the Welcome Centre. Manual wheelchairs are available to borrow on a first come, first served basis. There are tarmac paths almost everywhere including the parkland. The walled garden has crazy paving which can be bit bumpy and uneven in places and also some patches of deep gravel. During the summer you can travel in style on the accessible land train from Bridlington.

Skidby Windmill & Museum of East Riding **Rural Life**

Yorkshire's last working windmill – almost 200 years after the mill was built, wheat is still ground here. Only the ground floor of the mill is accessible, but webcams allow the tower to be viewed from downstairs. The museum displays the horticultural and rural history of the East Riding. Free car parking 100m from the mill; visitors with limited mobility can be dropped off at the top entrance road leading to the mill. Café and picnic area. Accessible toilet in the museum.

Off the A166 York – Bridlington Road. Beautiful stately home built in 1751. The gardens and 'Capability Brown' parkland offer enjoyment for all, with grazing deer nearby. Seasonal opening. All parts of the house (lift to first floor), café, shop and garden are wheelchair accessible. Two manual wheelchairs can be borrowed; it is advisable to book in advance.

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

Visit 'the world's first submarium' and discover the story of the world's oceans on a dramatic journey back in time and into the future. Electric and manual wheelchairs are available on a first come first served basis. Essential carers go free of charge. All levels are accessible by lift. Café, shop and picnic area. The café gives panoramic views over the Humber Estuary. 'Quiet Day' events run twice a year during which there are presentations with BSL interpretation. Audio and large print copies of The Deep guidebook available from reception. Changing Places toilet situated on the ground floor, past the reception desk.

Standing ¼ mile inland, it is the tallest lighthouse in England. 127 feet high, and 144 steps to the top, but non-climbers can see the town and coastline with a live camera feed. Wheelchair access to ground floor and toilet. One disabled parking space. Café and gardens. Seasonal opening.

Yorkshire Giant, Market Weighton

William Bradley (1787–1820), the 'Yorkshire Giant' lived in Market Weighton and at 7'9", was the tallest Englishman

ever. His house at the junction of York Road and Line Gate can be viewed from the outside, where a cast of his foot can also be seen. There is a statue of him on Holme Road. The Giant Bradley Heritage Trail is marked by 23 life size giant footprints (based on one of Bradleys shoes); a free colour leaflet is available from local outlets. He was buried inside All Saints Church on Market Place and is commemorated in a tablet on the north side of the baptistry. Accessible toilets on Londesborough Road (RADAR key required).

Take care at the road crossings where the old railway bridges have been removed. You can download a map from the website above.

Two sections of the trail; the old Sigglesthorne Station site and Goxhill to Southorpe, are Local Nature Reserves. Start in Hull, Hornsea or the picnic site at Skirlaugh. Take care at the road crossings where the old railway bridges have been removed.

Allerthorpe Woods

A large woodland 4 miles west of Pocklington managed by Forestry England. Some of the ancient heathland areas are maintained by the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust. Car park off Common Lane (charges apply). Across the road from the car park there is a wide, flat track which runs for about half a mile and allows you to explore the woodland and enjoy the birds and other wildlife; you might even be lucky enough to spot an adder! The nearest accessible toilets are on Railway Street in Pocklington (RADAR key required).

Barmby on the Marsh Wetlands

Barmby-on-the-Marsh, Goole, DN14 7HX

A small wetland nature reserve, located at the meeting point between the River Derwent and River Ouse and at the very southern tip of the Lower Derwent Valley (LDV) National Nature Reserve. The reserve is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), designated for its importance for wildfowl and lowland waders. Accessed via the end of the High Street, Barmby-on-the-Marsh. Accessible toilets, picnic tables and Blue Badge bays in the car park and benches along the way. A tarmac path from the car park takes you across the tidal barrage to a fence line with viewing slots, though they may not be easy for wheelchair users to see through. At the time of visiting there were plans to build a new bird viewing shelter/hide. Watch this space!

Bempton Cliffs RSPB

This sea cliff bird reserve is home to one of the UK's top wildlife spectacles; half a million seabirds gather here between March and August to raise a family on towering chalk cliffs, including gannets, guillemots, razorbills and puffins. Some cliff edge viewpoints are accessed via a hardsurfaced path and have wheelchair bays. Information centre, tea room, picnic area and accessible toilets on site. Tramper mobility scooters and manual wheelchairs are available to borrow; donations are appreciated, best to book in advance. Admission charge; carers free.

A Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust Site situated on the south bank of the Humber Estuary; a major east-west flyway for migrating birds and one of the UK strongholds for bittern. The pits and reedbeds are a legacy of the tile and cement industry which flourished between 1850 and 1959. The visitor centre has a small shop and you can enjoy a panoramic view of the reserve from upstairs (lift available). Two of the hides have wheelchair access. Accessible toilets and parking next to the visitor centre.

Hornsea Mere

Off Queens Gardens, Hornsea, HU18 1AX

The Mere is part of the Wassand Estate and the largest freshwater lake in Yorkshire. It is an area rich in bird life, attracting large numbers of overwintering ducks and geese. Follow Queens Gardens, off the B1242 and you will come to a viewpoint with a café and car park and plenty of seating to enjoy the lovely view! The café has a slight step/lip at the entrance, but should be negotiable with most wheelchairs. There are

toilets inside the café including a large one with ramped access, but no hand rails; the nearest fully accessible toilets are on Cinema Street and Marine Drive in Hornsea – RADAR key required.

North Cave Wetlands

This still-expanding Yorkshire Wildlife Trust nature reserve was a former sand and gravel workings. It has up to 2% of the national breeding population of avocets, one of Yorkshire's biggest sand martin colonies and up to 2,000 pairs of black-headed gulls, a nationally significant number. Footpaths are mainly made of stone and grass - all on a flat level. The stone paths are accessible all year round but grass paths can get very muddy in winter. Most of the hides are wheelchair accessible, except for Turret Hide which has steps up to it. Accessible compost toilets and a sheltered picnic area overlooking a bird feeding station are situated near to the entrance. There is a great little mobile café selling hot drinks and snacks in the car park most days (early morning to early afternoon).

North Duffield Carrs

The reserve is part of the Lower Derwent Valley National Nature Reserve and includes a level trail taking you alongside flood meadows which supports wintering and breeding wildfowl and waders. There is an accessible bird screen and hide along the trail. Some sections can be prone to flooding in the winter. The nearest accessible toilets are in Bank Island car park, south-east of Wheldrake, on the road to Thorganby.

Spurn National Nature Reserve

About 25 miles south east of Hull; from Easington follow the B1445 to Kilnsea. A unique coastal reserve, this 3½ mile long narrow sandy peninsula stretches out across the mouth of the Humber into the North Sea. Perfect opportunities for watching birds (especially on migration) and coastal wildlife, and exploring its fascinating history. Spurn Discovery Centre has a café, shop, information displays, accessible toilets and Blue Badge parking nearby. There is no vehicular access down to the Point and limited wheelchair access due to the sandy nature of the

terrain. The car park on Easington Road has accessible toilets, Blue Badge parking and great sea views and opportunities to bird watch.

Tophill Low Nature Reserve

Off the A164 Beverley to Driffield Road near Hutton Cranswick. The reserve is an active Yorkshire Water Treatment Works built in 1959 and opened as a nature reserve in 1993. It features 12 hides (7 of which are wheelchair accessible) spread across a 300 acre site that flanks the River Hull. Two reservoirs dominate the reserve and have SSSI status for their massive wildfowl numbers. Around the perimeter is a network of marshes, ponds, woodland and grassland. Visitor centre, car park with disabled bays, accessible toilet and picnic areas. Admission charge, available from the car park machine. Most of the reserve is accessed by easy, level paths, though a few mown paths can become muddy in winter. Mobility scooter available for loan by advance arrangement.

Waters' Edge Country Park

Situated on the waterfront next to the Humber Bridge. The park has a variety of habitats including reed beds, woodlands and wildflower meadows and is home to rich and varied wildlife including many rare and migratory birds. The main pathways are gravel, though they can be uneven in places. There is a wooden boardwalk across the lake near the visitor centre and several routes around the park of varying lengths. The visitor centre has a café and accessible toilets.

Outside East Yorkshire, these reserves have been included as they offer some of the finest and most accessible bird watching in the country.

600 acres of wetland close to the A1. The reserve has several accessible bird hides and boardwalks, as well as a visitor centre with an accessible toilet, refreshments for sale and an indoor picnic area overlooking a bird feeding area. A mobility scooter is available to borrow; best to book in advance. Further afield, most paths are accessible to wheelchair users though there are some undulating areas. The Lin Dike Link and Coal Tips trails provide up to four miles of gravel paths running alongside the River Aire. Parking charge for non-members, free for Blue Badge holders.

Dearne Valley – Old Moor RSPB

A wide variety of wetland habitats with accompanying bird, plants and animal life. During the winter it is an important stopping off point for ducks, geese and swans plus 8,000 golden plovers! Most paths are hardsurfaced and on a flat level. All hides and screens are wheelchair accessible. Mobility scooters are available to hire from the visitor centre for a small fee; booking is advised. Café on the first floor, accessed via the lift and plenty of picnic tables in the courtyard and on the reserve to eat your sandwiches! There is a height barrier in the car park; if you are in a large vehicle, phone ahead to arrange access or ring the intercom button on the drive before the car park. Admission charge, carers free.

Potteric Carr Nature Reserve

The reserve has much to offer wildlife enthusiasts with around 70 breeding bird species and an array of interesting plants and insects. The visitor centre, café and shop are fully accessible. Most of the paths are well surfaced and suitable for wheelchairs, as are most of the bird hides, though some paths can get muddy after wet weather; ask at the visitor centre for advice before heading out. Admission charge, carers free.

Local Nature Reserves are places for people and wildlife. They have wildlife or geological features that are of local interest and can provide people with study and learning opportunities or to simply enjoy having contact with nature. There are 11 Local Nature Reserves in the East Riding of Yorkshire, ranging from windswept coastal headlands, ancient woodlands and flower rich meadows to disused railways and chalk quarries. You can download leaflets which give details on accessibility for each site; they are available in Braille, audio and large print. Some of the reserves are listed below:

Beverley Parks

Long Lane, Beverley, HU17 ORN

The reserve features an orchard, a small wood and two fields which are being restored to a traditional parkland landscape. There is a surfaced level path around the orchard. The path from the car park to the parkland crosses a raised boardwalk with steps. The paths around the parkland are level but unsurfaced.

Danes Dyke

Off Flamborough Road, Bridlington, YO15 1AA

The tree trail through the woods follows surfaced paths. Due to the natural landscape paths crossing the ravine have several flights of steep steps (up to 100 steps). Access to the beach is via steps from the trails or down a steep road from the car park. There is no vehicular access for visitors on this road. A hard surfaced picnic area is located adjacent to the car park, with tables suitable for wheelchair users. There are toilet facilities but no accessible toilet.

Eastrington Ponds

Off Howden Road, Eastrington, DN14 7PL

From the car park there is a surfaced level path which leads around the main pond. The rail trail is firm but unsurfaced, there are steps to the borrow pits. The woodland picnic area is designed for wheelchair users. Nearest accessible toilets are on Charles Briggs Avenue in Howden (RADAR key required).

Howden Marsh

Marsh End, Howden, DN14 7DF

A small nature reserve in the centre of Howden with a mixture of habitats associated with flood meadows and ponds. There is no car park but there

is on street parking nearby. The reserve has a flat surfaced route and a boardwalk and picnic areas. Nearest accessible toilets are on Charles Briggs Avenue (RADAR key required).

Millington Wood

1 mile north of Millington village, YO42 1TZ

A beautiful woodland reserve. Access to the reserve from the car park follows a surfaced level track. On reaching the central clearing, the path continues on a gradual incline to a long steep flight of steps leading to the High View Point. The nearest accessible toilets are on Railway Street in Pocklington (RADAR key required).

Oakhill Nature Reserve

4A Lidice Road, Goole, DN14 6XL

Oakhill is a 150 acre nature reserve with ponds, meadows, wetlands and woodlands, stretching out beyond Goole. There is a surfaced track from the car park to the main pond. There are surfaced paths around the main pond and brick ponds. Paths through the meadow are firm but unsurfaced. There are three flights of steps in the woods. Free car park, no toilet facilities or refreshments. Nearest accessible toilets are on Estcourt Street in Goole (RADAR key required).

The RADAR National Key Scheme (NKS) ensures that one key will open wheelchair accessible toilets throughout the country. RADAR padlocks are also increasingly used on many nature reserves and cycle paths. Keys are available directly from Disability Rights UK.

Blue Badge Scheme

Blue Badges help people with disabilities or health conditions park closer to their destination. The scheme operates throughout the UK and is managed by local authorities, who deal with applications and issue Blue Badges. Blue Badge holders may:

- Park as long as they wish in a disc parking zone provided that the Blue Badge is displayed.
- Park on a single or double yellow line for up to three hours provided that the Blue Badge and time disc is displayed and the vehicle causes no obstruction.
- Always check individual car parks to see if you are required to pay or not as practice differs widely.
